I want to begin my second to the last newsletter column by saying how much I have enjoyed being Transitional Pastor for this church. And now we are coming to the time to say "Goodbye!" and "God bless you!" as we go our separate ways. After March 12<sup>th</sup> I will no longer be the Transitional Pastor of this church. I will be going on to another ministry.

Soon you will be sharing ministry with a new temporary Pastor, while the search for your next settled Pastor continues. And I want to affirm this vitally important thing: God is with you! The Spirit of God will guide you, give you wisdom, and reassure you through the future, which in some ways is largely unknown.

I want to share a few words about what it means to be your former Pastor. In a sentence, it means that I will not perform any pastoral function for you and will not discuss with you any specific aspects of the on-going life and ministries of the church. You must look to your new temporary minister for those functions and you must discuss with one another issues related to the life of this church. I will in this way support the ministry of your new temporary minister and ultimately the new settled minister.

While it is not easy for me to write these clear and specific words, it is necessary and the right thing for me to do. I will be your former minister and while I will always hold you in my heart with deep affection in Jesus Christ, I want to encourage your relationship with and reliance on your next minister. That is why this boundary must be very clear. At some future point I could be invited back to this church to perform a pastoral function, but that will only come at the initiative of the minister who is then your Pastor.

Now a word about our personal relationships. I leave my ministry carrying you in my heart with deep affection and prayerful thoughts. We have spent two years together and have shared many special events and life experiences. While we are ending our formal relationship as Pastor and people, our personal relationship will also undergo changes. I do not expect to encounter you in the grocery store, but I am sure that in the future, some of our paths will cross in various ways from time to time. I will be friendly and ask about how you are doing. And I hope that you do the same. One additional thing that I will not do is specifically reach out to you and initiate communication via social media. That does not mean I don't care; it means we have to respect the realities of new relationships with one another.

As we say our goodbyes over the next few weeks, I will wish you God's blessings as our paths go in new directions!

### From the Music Director

Well, we are in 2023! Neil Diamond just turned 82 a few days ago. Elvis would have been 87 a few weeks ago, and I just turned 70. I started playing in church at age 16, which means I have been doing this for 54 years. When I first took the job as organist / music director in the Housatonic Congregational church at age 16, it was a matter of economics. I could play Friday and Saturday nights at high school hops, and we got paid \$60!! No, not \$60 EACH, it was divided 5 ways. So that was \$12 EACH. But minimum wage then was \$1.25 per hour, so \$12 to play music for 3 hours and have a good time doing it, was a great deal. However, \$15 to play in church for an hour Sunday morning and not having to drag around an organ, was a much better deal. So, for the next 30 years I did both.

January is always a month where I can usually take a breath, re-charge and start preparing for the brandnew year. It has kind of always been that way. December was always a very busy month in the churches, and back in the band days, the Christmas parties and the normal Friday/Saturday nights stuff kept me busier than I would have liked. But I was younger, much younger, and it was fun despite the chaos of the schedule.

I am always amazed at the personal conversations, letters and emails that I receive after our Christmas Concerts informing me of how much people enjoyed them. Most of the time I am given much more credit than I deserve. The main job I have in the concerts is to make sure that I assign the right people to the right songs. Songs that not only fit their range, but also fit their style and presentation. That is what I do best, at least in my own mind. And I am blessed to have a Christmas Angels Chorus that understands that is what I try to do, even if they always don't agree with me. Back in the Earth Angels days, when people stopped me on the street and talked about the show they came to, the first question I always asked was "What was your favorite song"? I wanted to know what the song was that they were singing in the car driving home.

Each year many of you also let me know what you liked the best. That is all valuable information for the person putting next year's show together. So, I do thank you and your comments, good or not so good, are always welcome. And as I always tell you, without you, our audience, there would be no Christmas Concerts. Thank You ALL sincerely for your support. And everything that I do is always with the help of my wife Gail, and my best friends, Maria and Judy. I could not, and would not, do it without them.

In closing I don't often share emails or messages that I receive from people, but after getting permission from the author to do so, I decided to share this one with you. It comes from Frank Mazzarelli and his wife Dr. Carla Mazzarelli. Frank was the owner and my boss at the Egremont Country Club, after I retired in 2008. Although they now reside in Florida all winter, they wait until after Christmas because they love to come to the concerts. So, for all of the people that ask why I put the hours and effort into what I do, this is the reason.

Each and every year it seems to both of us, how much more talent is on that stage. However, we realize that the personalities behind that talent require a director with impeccable skills to put it all together. Carla & I feel "Honored" to call ourselves your friend. You and Gail have touched many, many folks in and around the Berkshires and the community is much better off having benefited from those efforts. As we age together, please take the time to look back and recognize how many lives you have touched, but more importantly, keep up your excellent commitment to your neighbors. You are one of a kind and we are fortunate to have you in our lives.
