

With thanks to volunteers from the Finance/Facilities and Mission/Ministry committees a revised Safe Church policy is in the works. It will reflect a prayerful policy with new procedures of preparedness that seek to balance our extravagant welcome with our safety. I know this may mean a few changes, but hopefully these changes will be welcomed!

On another note...I am planning a mini-Psalm Retreat toward the end of summer that will include a study of the psalms and an opportunity to write our own psalm. With psalms so creation-centered, I thought it would be nice to hold this outdoors in the cool of the morning (or early evening). Date/time yet to be decided. Also upcoming for those who like to walk/hike, I am planning a weekly opportunity to walk together, beginning mid-July. The first walk will be an easy meditative walk around St. Helena's Meditation Meadow (a flat, mown path around a lovely meadow with benches to rest for contemplation or prayer). Other walks will include easy hikes into the woods to enjoy the silence and beauty of nature. You all choose where. Please let me know what regular day and time is best for you. No commitment is necessary, just a wish to walk when and as you are able. We could meet at the church and carpool or meet at the walking site. Whatever works best.

From the Music Director

"Summertime and the livin' is easy". When George Gershwin wrote that song it is obvious that he did not have my schedule.



So last month I focused my newsletter on a thoroughbred racehorse named Secretariat, who I believe, as do most people, remains to this day the greatest of all time. All 3 of his record-

breaking winning times of each of the 3 Triple Crown races have still never been equaled since he set them 50 years ago. That in itself is pretty amazing, and yes, everybody loved Secretariat. As I said, "Everybody loves a winner. But today I want to introduce you to another racehorse. His name was Zippy Chippy who was born on April 20, 1991. His bloodline pedigree was that of a champion including horses like Buckpasser, Bold Ruler and Man o' War. At 3 years old Zippy was not performing very well and also not behaving very well on the track. He ended up with Felix Monserrate at his horse farm in NY in a trade for a 7-year old Ford pickup truck. Felix thought he could straighten Zippy out, but soon Zippy would be banned from some tracks for his "antics" such as refusing to break from the starting gate. The gate would fling open, the bell would ring, the jockey would let out a scream and all the horses would shoot out of the gate, except for Zippy. He would simply turn his head and look at the rider as if to say "want to trade places"? He also had a bad habit of trying to bite people and picking people up by their collars and not letting them down until he was ready. He definitely had a mean streak in him. In 2000 "People" magazine included Zippy Chippy on its list of that year's most interesting personalities. But that is not why he became a famous loser. Eventually Felix got Zippy to settle down as he got older and he continued to race. But there was another problem. He wasn't very fast. But he continued to race until 2004 when he retired after losing his 100th career race without a victory. That is almost certainly another record that will never be broken. But as the years went by and Zippy raced at Finger Lakes and the Fair Circuit here

in Massachusetts, a strange thing happened. As his losses hit an incredible 70 out of 70, he found a fan club. People would go to the track just to see him win his first race. I had the opportunity to see Zippy run his last 2 races both taking place at Northampton Fair. His connections were selling T-Shirts with his image, glasses, mugs and other trinkets. People were spending their \$2 on a ticket with no intention of cashing it should he actually win. People would chant his name and cheer as he paraded by. In his 99th race, he led by 5 lengths into the short stretch at Northampton and then suddenly just slowed down like he was thinking "what am I doing? I got a real good thing with this winless streak. Everybody loves me! " And lose he did finishing second as if to say, "Yea, I could have won if I had wanted to". Yes, he was a character, and the biggest "loser" in the history of horse racing in the United States. He retired to the "Old Friends Thoroughbred Retirement Farm" near Saratoga in 2010. Two years later he went on tour in Kentucky to bring attention to the safe retirement of racehorses, and of course Zippy Chippy merchandise was sold everywhere to raise money for the retirement farm. In 2016 he was featured in a book called "The Legend of Zippy Chippy" and also featured in a children's book called "The True Story of Zippy Chippy: The Little Horse that Couldn't". Zippy died at the age of 30 in April of 2022. He will probably hold on forever to the longest losing streak and no one would refer to him as a "winner". But everybody ended up loving him. So yes, it is true that everybody "loves a winner", but sometimes it is also true that "everybody loves a loser". Maybe you already figured this out that these last two newsletters were not really about horses, or especially horse racing. It was about how I look at people. It is about how I have tried to live my life, seeing good in people, all people. Whether a person is the greatest or the worst, the fastest or the slowest, the richest or the poorest, white or black, gay or straight, there is something to love and celebrate about them. And in the closing words of Paul Harvey, "And now you know the rest of the story".

2023 COPS Conference [Church Office Professionals Conference] Growing Congregations after the Pandemic

I had the pleasure and honor of attending the Secretaries Conference at the Craigville Retreat Center on the Cape from Sun, June 11 – Tues, June 13. It was a time of renewing friendships and networking with other church secretaries.

We covered three main topics: Growing Congregations after the Pandemic, Social Media, and Networking for Church Office Staff with the first two presented by Rev. Timoth Sylvia. Some of the key points were:

- Who Are We? Make sure you have a clear Mission and Vision Statement
- People need an experience, which might not necessarily be a service on Sunday morning

- Creating Community and Connections.
 Become more visible in the community by doing activities outside of the church building
- 4) Digital Ministry, how best to reach and engage people via social media
- 5) Agility & Nimbleness, constantly keeping things new and fresh. Be willing to change and shift the way you do things to hold people's attention.
- 6) Increasing member giving show the church and wider community how our dollars help benefit the wider community, not help running the finances of the church

He also provided us with several helpful resource books.

Each year we collect food pantry items and monetary donations for two organizations. This year we selected Independent House which aids people who have been victims of domestic and sexual abuse https://independencehouse.org/ and Cystic Fibrosis https://www.cff.org/ as our two organizations.

In addition, we decorated 'Blessing & Gratitude Jars'. These offer us a place to note special moments in our lives. We can then look through our jars throughout the year reminding us of the many blessings that we have had.

The conference wrapped up with a church service and communion. This year it was led by Rev. Philomena Hare from the FCC in Wareham, MA

These conferences have allowed me to form a lasting friendship with other church secretaries sharing issues in our work, personal lives and creating a strong support system for one another. We are available throughout the year to help each other with any questions which might arise.
